3rd Sunday of Advent—December 15, 2024

Today is 'GAUDETE' SUNDAY, in this third week of Advent. Today is known as JOY Sunday. That is why the pink candle is used on our Advent wreath.

Today all the Scriptures speak about joy, rejoicing, and practical steps to achieve joy. Joy is not like happiness. It is a fruit of the Holy Spirit. Joy is an action of the will where you choose to live in God's presence every day, even when the world around is cracking at the seams. Yet you find immense joy through this. Suffering then becomes fruitful and valiant, and you know that God is God and that we are not. In everything we do, He is our Lord.

Zephaniah, Isaiah, and Luke all discuss the gladness, the joy, and the rejoicing that takes place when Israel can shout and proclaim the marvels of the Lord. It includes not being afraid, not being anxious or discouraged. Paul tells us that with joy we do not need to have anxiety; but instead we can place all our petitions, prayers and blessings before the Lord. God who is faithful, will answer us and teach us how to live in Him.

John the Baptist has come to prepare the way of the Lord. Advent is a time to prepare. People waited in expectation for the coming of the Lord to Israel and John reveals the One who is to come. John provides practical ways to be just and kind towards others in whatever state of life we are. John comes to remind the people that he is not the Messiah, but that one greater than he will come in time. This Messiah, Jesus, will be the one to save all His people. John is only a voice preparing the way of the Lord. His mission will cost him everything. But it is all worth it for knowing the joy of Christ!

May this GAUDETE Sunday fill each of us with joy so that we can await the coming of our Messiah at Christmas, and when he comes again at the end of time. May the Joy of this Advent lead us to Bethlehem. For the Lord is coming and this is the time to make ready for HIM.

Advent Reflections 2024 — Week 3

3rd Sunday of Advent: Prepare

Preparing Our Souls for Christmas

Most of us are very good at the gift-buying, the baking and meal-prepping, the decorating for gatherings and festivities at Christmas. However, we can sometimes forget to prepare our souls for Jesus' arrival—and our souls are where He comes to stay and wants to be!

Our interior preparations are the most important. Rather than being the focus, our external preparations should *accompany* our interior devotions and preparations.

All our decorating, caroling, gift-wrapping, and hosting should help us create an atmosphere that keeps our focus on the Christ Child. That way our heart can be a spiritual nativity scene, with our soul kneeling at the manger of God-made-man.

Some Practical Tips

1. Pray while you work.

As you prepare exteriorly, make conversation with Our Lord. Speak with Him.

Offer things to Him. Make Him the goal of each task. You can say such prayers as:

"Jesus, here I am wrapping gifts. Here I am preparing the guest room. I offer You these tasks. May I do them for love of You, and may my heart be a place of repose for you, my Lord."

Short prayers like this are an enormous help in keeping our focus on the God who loves us—and can purify the goals and intentions that we have for the Christmas season.

2. Ponder the lyrics of Advent hymns and Christmas carols.

We are so familiar with traditional Christmas carols that it's easy to overlook the profound, heart-piercing beauty of their lyrics.

Taking the time to print out these lyrics, and to reflect on them while we listen to the music, can be a fruitful spiritual exercise. Consider, for example, the words of O Holy Night, written in the 19th century:

O holy night, the stars are brightly shining; It is the night of our dear Savior's birth.

Long lay the world, in sin and error pining 'Til He appeared and **the soul felt its worth.**

This stanza alone is a theological powerhouse. We feel the keen sense of sin, sorrow, and loneliness experienced by the unredeemed human soul—and then, amidst the white glimmer of starlight, we understand that our Savior has shown us the inestimable value He places on our souls by coming *in person* to rescue us.

3. Fast in some small way.

Advent is a penitential season, and therefore a season to offer penance. We can choose something, however small, to fast from and offer to Jesus. The Sundays of Advent are not fast days. During the rest of the week, however, save the feasting for Christmas itself.

Use prudential judgment here, of course: if you are invited to a family Christmas party, for example, there's no need to draw attention by avoiding sweets and eating dry crackers.

However, if you have received a luscious box of chocolates as a personal gift, it would be a perfect Advent sacrifice to tuck that box away until Christmas arrives.

4. Learn how to better prepare for receiving Holy Communion.

When we are expecting guests, we take special efforts to clean our homes and make sure that our visitors feel welcome.

The best way to prepare for Jesus is to go to Confession frequently. We can seek to be better disposed to receive Jesus and the graces He brings by offering before and after Communion prayers.

The saints also give us beautiful writings that can deepen our understanding and love for the Blessed Sacrament.

Ask Our Lady for her help in receiving Jesus with love and tenderness.

Conclusion

Prepare this Advent to receive Christ **as though he were coming for the first time**. Make this Christmas a celebration of the birth of our Savior and the great gift of faith we have received. By striving to live in the presence of Christ during Advent, we will receive the best present of all: our Savior.
