Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph—December 29, 2024

On this Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph let's dig into today's scripture readings. There are some similarities between Samuel and Jesus and likewise similarities between Hannah and Mary. We see the faith that Hannah had with the blessing she received from God with the birth of Samuel when she gave him to God in the temple. Jesus was found in the temple and went home with Mary and Joseph. Jesus went home and was obedient to his parents. Jesus was obedient to Mary and Joseph by going back to Nazareth, but also obedient to God by being obedient to Mary and Joseph. This was the beginning of the first domestic church with Jesus, Mary and Joseph. We need to find God in our homes and build our faith every day in our homes. We can accomplish this by reading the scriptures, praying together, and journeying in our faith together as a family. Just like Mary who pondered these things in her heart, we need to ponder these things in our hearts. Let's all take time to say the rosary and meditate on each decade just like Mary would meditate. This past advent for our parish retreat we had an opportunity to pray and meditate on the gospel readings using the Households of Faith format. In this format, we read the readings together with a few friends and discuss simple questions after each reading of scripture:

- 1. What word or phrase struck me today?
- 2. What is the Good News in this reading today?
- 3. How is God speaking to me through the gospel and the sharing today?

It's a very simple method that allows the Word of God to speak to you so that you can apply his word to your life. I was very blessed to walk with each person that attended.

Advent Reflections 2024 - Week 4

4th Sunday of Advent: Watch and Wait

Watching and Waiting

Like life itself, Advent is a time of waiting. Awaiting the birth of the Christ Child on Christmas morning reminds us to turn any periods of waiting in our lives into times of interior fruitfulness, with God's grace.

God has His purposes, of course, for anything that seems like delay. For example, God's chosen people waited century after century to receive the Messiah—but God had reasons for not sending Him right away. Man had to learn by experience the evil and misery of sin, and recognize the fact that he could not save himself. We needed a divine liberator.

Now the Church, the New Israel, awaits His return at the end of the world—the Second Coming being the other preparatory focus of Advent. It's not an easy wait, since the Church is confronted by "the spiritual forces of evil" (Ephesians 6:12) that seek to devour souls.

We know, however, that Christ is already Victor.

Though **already present in his Church**, **Christ's reign is nevertheless yet to be fulfilled** "with power and great glory" by the King's return to earth...

According to the Lord, the present time is the time of the Spirit and of witness, but also a time still marked by "distress" and the trial of evil which does not spare the Church and ushers in the struggles of the last days. It is a time of waiting and watching.

- The Catechism of the Catholic Church, 671-672

Waiting is a teacher all its own. Waiting reminds us that we cannot save ourselves. We cannot even help ourselves. We cannot control events or make our lives what we want them to be. Waiting—and watching—keeps us dependent on God, our "divine liberator." That's one reason why it's so important for us to experience it.

If we struggle with what seems like a delay in God's promises, we can find hope in waiting by remembering that there is purpose in it—hidden though it may be—and lessons to be learned from it.

Don't Fall Asleep at Your Post

The command to "watch and wait" comes from Our Lord Himself:

"Let your loins be girded and your lamps burning, and **be like men who are waiting** for their master to come home from the marriage feast, so that they may open to him at once when he comes and knocks...**You also must be ready**; for the Son of man is coming at an hour you do not expect." *—Luke 12:35-36, 40*

"Watch therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour." -Matthew 25:13

What are we staying alert for? We are staying alert so that we can recognize temptation when it comes and resist it. We are keeping watch so that we can strive for final perseverance in the Faith. We are keeping vigilant for the will of God in our lives and for our decisive encounter with Him, whether that takes place with His second coming or on our deathbed.

How Should We "Watch and Wait"?

Advent is the perfect time to "practice" the art of joyful waiting. This waiting shouldn't be sleepy, passive, or indifferent. Instead, our faith calls us to a joyful, active, hopeful waiting. How many of us experience this when we are expecting the visit of a loved one whom we haven't seen in years? Don't we anticipate their arrival by looking out the window and feeling too excited to sit down?

Well, we can pray for the same eagerness in expectation of Our Lord Jesus Christ. We can ask our Heavenly Father to grant us holy eagerness both for Christmas Day and for the Second Coming of Christ. How else can we cultivate an attitude of watching and waiting?

The answer is simple: **by faithfully attending to the tasks and duties of our state in life**. In other words, by *doing what we're supposed to be doing*.

We tend to think of holiness as resulting from heroic deeds and mystical experiences and the founding of religious orders. But wisdom reveals that holiness comes from tending to each duty of the moment "in quietness and in trust" (Isaiah 30:15). And the way to prepare for Christ's coming—now and at any time—is by faithfully fulfilling our responsibilities for the sake of becoming holy.

Stay alert. Do what you are supposed to do. Fulfill your responsibilities. Pray. These things are simple—though not as easy as they sound. They should make up our efforts as we strive to "watch and wait."

When we have done these things, we will be able to say: "Behold, everything is ready." Everything is prepared. And now, we wait—alert and eager—and we watch for the approach of the One we are expecting.

May God fill your hearts with His peace and grant you a Merry Christmas.

On this final Sunday of Advent, we are on the doorstep of Christmas. Today's Gospel (Luke 1:39-45) gives us the powerful example of Mary's trust in God's providence. Amid uncertainty, Mary, with child, sets out to be with her cousin Elizabeth trusting in God's accompaniment.

It is the response of John within Elizabeth's womb that leads to her proclamation, "Most blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. Though she didn't understand fully what was happening, she trusted and delighted in God's presence. The Pilgrims of Hope, like Mary and Elizabeth, are called to trust, to joyfully surrender, and to believe that God's promises will come to fruition, even when the way is unclear.

In this final week of Advent, we are reminded to trust in God's plan for our lives and to prepare our hearts to receive Jesus with the same joy, trust and openness that Mary and Elizabeth demonstrated. Just as Mary was a faithful pilgrim, so too are we called to walk in faith, trusting that God's presence will guide us through all the unknowns of life.

As we approach Christmas, let us ask ourselves: How can I trust more deeply in God's plan for my life? How can I open my heart to His coming in a new and profound way? Let us prepare for the arrival of Christ with hearts full of faith and trust in His promises.

Reflections for the Separated & Divorced: Grief, Divorce, and Getting Through the Holidays

A Catholic divorce support program participant leaned into my ear conspiratorially, "You know what really bothers me about the holidays? Matching family pajamas!" Translation: She rejects the social media image of what the "perfect" family holiday season should look like—all the seemingly effortless smiles, meticulously wrapped presents, and immaculately white carpets. Divorce and separation are the loss of a marriage. As with any loss, it is important to grieve. A friend once shared, "The first Christmas after my separation felt liberating. I remember convincing my sister to go out and have drinks with me on Christmas Eve. It was the second and third Christmases that felt brutal." Denial, anger, bargaining, depression and eventual acceptance are all part of the grief cycle. Grief is anything but a linear process. Try not to expect to feel a certain way by a certain time. Instead, be present to your emotions where and when they arise. Some people are irritated by holiday festivities under the best of circumstances. Others welcome the distraction. Trust yourself to discern what you really need. Well-meaning friends and family might try to offer advice on how to celebrate the holidays. Take the suggestions with a grain of salt.
